



**For Northeast Kansas
as of 1:30 p.m. CST
Tuesday, December 8, 2009**

Current Weather Forecast:

Northeast Kansas, including Topeka/Lawrence Metro Area

This Afternoon: Snow, freezing rain, and sleet. High near 32. East wind between 5 and 10 mph. Chance of precipitation is 100%. Little or no ice accumulation expected. Total daytime snow and sleet accumulation of 3 to 5 inches possible.

Tonight: Snow before midnight, then areas of blowing snow and a chance of snow after midnight. Low around 11. Wind chill values between -6 and 4. Windy, with a north wind 10 to 15 mph increasing to between 25 and 30 mph. Winds could gust as high as 40 mph. Chance of precipitation is 100%. New snow accumulation of 1 to 3 inches possible.

Winter Storm Warning

Marshall-Nemaha-Brown-Riley-Pottawatomie-Jackson-Jefferson-Geary-Morris-Wabaunsee-Shawnee-Douglas-Lyon-Osage-including the cities of...Marysville...Hiawatha...Manhattan...Junction City...Topeka...Lawrence...Emporia.

Winter storm warning now in effect until 6 am CST Wednesday, December 9.

Accumulations: storm total amounts commonly from 7 to 12 inches with locally 15 inches along and north of a line from Herington to Oskaloosa; 4 to 9 inches south of a line from Herington to Oskaloosa.

Winds: will increase and become northwesterly at 20 to 30 mph with gusts to 40 mph this evening...causing blowing and drifting snow...low visibilities and dropping wind chill values into the minus 5 to minus 20 degree range

Greater Kansas City Metro Area

This Afternoon: Snow, freezing rain, and sleet. High near 33. East wind between 6 and 9 mph. Chance of precipitation is 100%. Total daytime ice accumulation of around a 0.1 of an inch possible. Total daytime snow and sleet accumulation of 1 to 2 inches possible.

Tonight: Snow before midnight, then widespread blowing snow and a chance of snow after midnight. Low around 14. Wind chill values between -5 and 5. Blustery, with a north northwest wind 9 to 12 mph increasing to between 23 and 26 mph. Winds could gust as high as 37 mph. Chance of precipitation is 100%. New snow accumulation of 1 to 3 inches possible.

Winter Weather Advisory

Miami-Johnson KS-Chariton-Randolph-Jackson-Lafayette-Saline-Cass-Johnson MO, including the cities of: Paola...Overland Park...Olathe...Salisbury...Keytesville...Moberly...Kansas City...Independence...Lexington...Concordia...Marshall...Raymore...Harrisonville...Pleasant Hill...Warrensburg.

The National Weather Service in Kansas City/Pleasant Hill has issued a winter weather advisory for snow and sleet...which is in effect until 6 am CST Wednesday, December 9.

For areas along and southeast of a Kansas City to Marshall to Moberly line. Skies should remain generally cloudy overnight with a few patches of light snow or flurries possible. Little to no accumulation is expected. Dry air will likely limit precipitation during the day Tuesday as well...with areas of light snow or drizzle expected. Temperatures should warm to around freezing by afternoon but some freezing drizzle may be possible during the morning resulting in a few slick spots.

The greatest impact along and south of the Missouri River will likely occur Tuesday night as snow overspreads the area ahead of an approaching strong storm system. Snow may be briefly heavy during the evening hours, but accumulations

will be limited by the forward speed of the storm. Areas from Kansas City to Marshall may see 2 to 4 inches of snowfall during the evening...with amounts increasing further north and west and decreasing toward the south and east.

After the transition back to snow, blowing snow and bitterly cold wind chills are expected late Tuesday night into Wednesday as strong northerly winds of 25 to 35 mph overspread the region. The blowing snow may greatly reduce visibilities...creating even more dangerous driving conditions. Temperatures will fall through the teens into the single digits Wednesday night with wind chill readings below zero.

Current Road Conditions

Snow and/or sleet continues to fall on and off throughout Northeast Kansas. Snow has begun to fall again in the northern counties along the US-36 corridor, as road conditions in these counties had improved but has now changed back to partly snowpacked.

Snowfall amounts vary throughout the Northeast Kansas area, anywhere from 2 inches up to 6 inches the further north you head, and the snow fall totals may increase in some areas throughout the day on Tuesday.

KDOT crew will continue to treat (with sand/salt mixture) and plow roadways throughout the afternoon and into the evening/overnight hours as needed.

Driver Safety Tips

For travel throughout today, drivers should use caution, allow plenty of driving time, and be sure to turn on their headlights, and turn off their cruise control. Drivers should also provide for a safe distance or cushion between themselves and vehicles ahead of them.

We also want to remind drivers to stay a safe distance back from KDOT snow plows, and if drivers should pass the snow plows, to be extra careful and allow plenty of room as the trucks do travel slower than surrounding traffic.
