Current Weather Forecast:

Northeast Kansas, including Topeka/Lawrence Metro Area

Late Afternoon: Rain and possibly a thunderstorm. High near 45. North wind around 10 mph. Chance of precipitation is 100%.

Tonight: Rain. Low around 29. Blustery, with a north wind between 10 and 20 mph, with gusts as high as 30 mph. Chance of precipitation is 100%.

Thursday: Snow and widespread blowing snow. High near 31. Windy, with a north wind between 20 and 30 mph, with gusts as high as 40 mph. Chance of precipitation is 90%. New snow accumulation of 2 to 4 inches possible.

Winter Storm WARNING – NEW!!

JEFFERSON-SHAWNEE-DOUGLAS-OSAGE-FRANKLIN-COFFEY-ANDERSON INCLUDING THE CITIES

The National Weather Service in Topeka has issued a winter storm warning for heavy snow and blowing snow, which is in effect from Noon Thursday to 6 pm CST Friday. *The winter storm watch is no longer in effect.*

Timing: rain Thursday morning will rapidly change to snow in the afternoon across the warned area.

Total snow accumulations: snowfall accumulations of six to 8 inches will be possible by Friday afternoon. Locally higher amounts are possible. Heavy snow will move eastward through the day Thursday affecting all areas by Thursday afternoon.

Winds: northerly winds will increase to 25 to 35 mph with gusts as high as 45 mph on Thursday into Friday. This will result in reduced visibilities, with near blizzard conditions at times, as well as blowing and drifting snow.

Impacts: travel will become nearly impossible Thursday afternoon through Friday.

Greater Kansas City Metro Area

Late Afternoon: Occasional showers and possibly a thunderstorm. High near 50. East wind around 11 mph. Chance of precipitation is 100%. New rainfall amounts of less than a tenth of an inch, except higher amounts possible in thunderstorms.

Tonight: Occasional showers and possibly a thunderstorm. Low around 39. East wind 8 to 10 mph becoming north. Chance of precipitation is 100%. New rainfall amounts between a quarter and half of an inch possible.

Thursday: Occasional rain, snow, and sleet. Temperature falling to around 27 by 5pm. Breezy, with a north northwest

wind 9 to 12 mph increasing to between 20 and 23 mph. Winds could gust as high as 32 mph. Chance of precipitation is 90%. New snow and sleet accumulation of 1 to 3 inches possible.

Winter Storm Watch

Winter storm watch remains in effect from Thursday morning through Friday afternoon.

Rain may change to freezing rain and sleet as early as Thursday morning. Then through the afternoon Thursday mixed winter precipitation will gradually switch to all snow.

Ice and sleet accumulations up to a tenth of an inch will be possible through Thursday afternoon. After changing to snow late Thursday afternoon total snowfall accumulations through Friday afternoon may be in the 5 to 10 inch range.

Strong northwest to west winds will develop Thursday afternoon through Friday with sustained winds possibly reaching 30 mph with a few higher gusts. This will create extensive blowing and drifting of snow and near blizzard conditions.

Travel may become extremely dangerous Thursday afternoon through Friday...with periods of heavy snow possible and significantly reduced visibilities. Persons planning on traveling for the holiday should either leave today...or make alternative plans.

Precautionary/preparedness actions: A winter storm watch means there is a potential for significant snow...sleet...or ice accumulations that may impact travel. Continue to monitor the latest forecasts.

Current Road Conditions

KDOT crews are ready and prepared to hit the roadways once the sleet/ice/snow begins. No pre-treating will take place in advance of the storm due to the rain, as it would simply wash any treatment product off the roadways.

Current roadways are primarily wet due to the rain for most northeast Kansas counties. *See the chart below for current roadway conditions for individual northeast Kansas counties.*

Please remind DRIVERS as they travel about during the next couple of days to:

1. Take it SLOW!
2. Allow plenty of extra drive time.
3. Watch for icy/slick spots on the roadway; don't assume that if the pavement looks clear, that it is.
4. Buckle up every passenger, every time.

Driver Safety Tips

For travel throughout the evening and overnight hours, drivers should use caution, allow plenty of driving time, buckle up (every passenger, every time) and be sure to turn on their headlights, and turn off their cruise control. Drivers should also provide for a safe distance or cushion between themselves and vehicles ahead of them.

We also want to remind drivers to stay a safe distance back from KDOT snow plows, and if drivers should pass the snow plows, to be extra careful and allow plenty of room as the trucks do travel slower than surrounding traffic.

Updated Kansas road conditions are at your fingertips. New!! **KanDrive** is the new online portal, www.KanDrive.org, that displays information from KDOT’s traveler information technology, including highway cameras, dynamic message signs, traffic management centers and 511 phone, online and mobile (<http://511mm.ksdot.org>). Snapshots from more than 30 closed-circuit cameras along I-70 between Topeka and Colorado and along other highways in the state, as well as camera views from the KC Scout system are available through the new online site, so users can see the roadway conditions.
